







To show Broadfield Down in relation to Iwood







IWOOD'S LORDS AND TENANTS 1228-1840.

In 1228 Iwood was granted to **Stephen**, the bishop of Bath's chamberlain (Charter Rolls Vol 1 p77). The bishop also gave his chamberlain the mill of Congresbury, West Mill, with its soke, a villein, a fardel of land and an aldergrove all outside Iwood (BRO 04235 f54(i)).

In 1254 Nichola, once wife of Stephen the chamberlain, granted a tenement in Congresbury to Robertus le Maresc' (Cal. Close Rolls 1929 p161).

Both grants to Stephen were confirmed in Somerset's Hundred Rolls of 1275. Also recorded is a Bartholomew de la More holding one virgate of land in Congresbury in a purpresture, or clearance, and the bank of the river Wring (alias the Yeo), previously common land. (Rotuli Hundredorum 1818 pp 129-30) This Bartholomew, possibly the son of Robertus le Maresc', was the father or grandfather of Stephen de la More born c1261/2 (Cal IPMs Vol III p4) - see De la More family tree, Appendix 1.

A final concord of 1317 shows this Stephen de la More and his wife Constance owned 2 messuages, 2 mills, 2 carucates and 25 acres of land, 50 acres of meadow, 20 acres of wood with 26s in rent in Yatton, Congresbury and Banwell (SRS 1898 p67/8). Stephen died in 1328 and an Inquisition Post Mortem (IPM) shows him and his wife holding 2 carucates of land in Yatton & Ywode, value £10 p.a., plus in Oldland Gloucestershire, a messuage and land with an extent. Stephen's heir was his son William then aged 15 (Cal IPM Vol VII p118 & PRO C135/11). Stephen's widow, granted part of Oldland as dower (Cal IPM Vol VII 1909 p492) later remarried.

Stephen's son William married Maud, daughter of John de Button (Bitton), and three children are recorded, Cecily, who married Sir Nicholas de Berkeley, Margaret and John. William died in 1340; his IPM states that his heir was his son John aged 3 years. Maud later married Sir Simon Basset, Gloucestershire's escheator and they had three sons (Ellacombe 1881 p195).

Iwood's accounts, 1341-52, (BL Add Roll 7663-9) show the Lord's house was at Iwelegh, or Uley, in Gloucestershire, where the Bassets held half the manor. A 1351 court roll of Congresbury Manor lists Simon Basset among its free tenants (SRO DD/SAS BA1) and a 1364 court roll of Iwood and Yatton shows the "lord" was Maud Basset (BL Add Roll 7670). Thus Iwood, Yatton and Oldland were held by William then his son John de la More with the Bassets managing the estate until John died in 1350 and for a period after. John's IPM gives his heir as his sister Cecily (Ellacombe 1883 pp291-2).

A final concord, 1366, shows Nicholas de Berkely and his wife Cecily owning the "Manor of Iwode with 2 messuages, 2 carucates of land & 60 shillings rent in Yatton, Congresbury & Lokkeston". Cecily's mother Maud Basset held this property for her life and after her death it was to go to Maurice and then to Edmund Basset, Cecily's two surviving half-brothers, for their lives (SRS Vol 17 1902 pp189-90). Maud died in 1389 (Smyth 1885 p184).

Cecily died in 1393 and her IPM (PRO C136/80) lists her Somerset lands:
In Congresbury, a messuage, two water mills and 80 acres of land & meadow held from Ralph Bishop of Bath & Wells out of his Congresbury manor, for 8 marks annually.

In Yatton, a messuage and 80 acres of land & meadow also held from Bishop Ralph for 13s 4d annually.

In Gloucestershire she held half the manor of Button alias Oldelonde. These were the lands her grandfather Stephen de la More had held.

Reversions of Iwood and Yatton were successively to Edmund Basset for his life and then to John Loterell (Luttrell) of East Quantoxhead, John Bluet, William Poulet the elder and three others and to their heirs. Maurice Basset had therefore died and Edmund was Iwood's lord. Edmund was alive in 1417, when he witnessed a charter (Harvey undated p360). Sir John Luttrell died in 1403 without legitimate heirs (Dunning 1991 p31) and so the property passed to the Bluett family on Edmund's death.

IPMs in 1441 for Agnes Bevylle, once John Bluet's wife, show that she held Iwood manor (Yatton is not mentioned) with other lands in Somerset, Devon, Cornwall and Oxfordshire. Her son and heir was another John Bluet, then aged 40 years and more (PRO C139/105 & IPM 1828 p207).

John Bluet married Agnes Bewpenny, daughter of Sir Thomas Bewpenny and his wife Joane, "daughter and co-heir of Sir Stephen de la More" says Vivian (Vivian 1895 pp 92-3). However, a 1409 IPM states that Agnes was the daughter of Sir Thomas Beaupine and his wife, Margaret, not Joane. John Bluet was dead before 1409, because Agnes, aged 23, was then married to John Bevylle. Agnes was therefore born c1386. (Cal IPM 1992 p191) The writ for Stephen de la More's inquisition was issued in August 1328, so any daughter was born by April 1329. She would therefore have been at least 57 when Agnes was born c1386, a medieval miracle! More likely, Margaret was Stephen's grand-daughter or great-grand-daughter, although not proven, but why otherwise was any connection mentioned? It appears probable that Iwood passed once again to descendants of the de la Mores along the female line.

A single court held in 1461 records the manor as "Ywode Blwet" and mentions a charter with John and Agnes Blwet's seals (BL Add Roll 7671). This document includes "Yatton Blwet" so Yatton was included with Iwood in Agnes' Inquisition. John Bluet died in 1463 and his Somerset IPM lists Iwood and six other Somerset manors including two that Agnes had held in 1441. (Cal IPM Vol IV 1828 p321).

Accounts for Congresbury Manor, 1474/5, show payment of 106s 8d (8 marks) for one free tenement in Ywode (H&W RO Worcs Diocese 009:1 BA2636/162). In 1497/8 and 1503/4, 106s 8d was paid by Nicholas Blewet, John's grandson and in 1527/8 by the heirs of Nicholas Blewet, for the same free tenement. (SRO DD/CC 131919 6/8, DD/SAS BA3&4).

In 1548 the Crown dispossessed the Bishop of Bath and Wells of Congresbury manor and gave it to Sir George Owen, Henry VIII's physician. William Carr, a Bristol merchant, eventually purchased the manor and passed it to his son John. He gave it to found Queen Elizabeth's Hospital (QEH) in Bristol for poor male orphans of Bristol and Congresbury manor. Bristol's Council were appointed trustees for the Hospital and were lords of Congresbury manor until 1921. (Cran 1983 pp 40-42)

Iwood's rent was thus paid in turn to Owen, Carr and the QEH Trustees instead of the Bishop. Roger Blewet, Nicholas' grandson, appears as a free tenant in Congresbury's court rolls, 1553 (BRO 33041 BMC/12/2) and 1562 (BRO 04235). In January 1566/7 his death was reported, a relief of 106s 8d was paid and his widow ordered to produce the charter by which she held the property, a copy of which is included in the survey made later that year (BRO 04235).

Throughout the court records and surveys of the second half of the 16th and 17th centuries members of the Bluet/Blewet family paid the rent of 106s 8d with their lands described, generally as "The Mylles and land in Iwood" (BRO 04793). In 1649 the death of "--- Blewett gentleman free tenant of this manor" was reported but the heir was unknown (BRO 33041 BMC/4/35(a)). In 1656, the manor was again surveyed and

still "The heirs of Mr Blewett" paid the chief rent of £5 6s 8d (BRO 04237). John Blewet, the last male Blewet to hold Iwood had in fact died in 1634. Clearly there was considerable lack of communication. Most of John's estate was divided between his four surviving daughters. See Blewet family tree, Appendix 1.

A rental of Blewet manors, 1647, includes Congresbury [Iwood] and shows payment of the chief rent of £5 6s 8d (SRO DD/X/FRC 10). Various other documents (SRO DD/SL 5; DD/SF 408, 446 & 1036) show the daughters holding on to their fractions of their inheritance and in turn bequeathing them to their children and grandchildren, one, at least, of whom still held his share in 1715. These descendants presumably received their proportions of the rents, but nothing shows they ever visited Iwood.

It seems possible, therefore, that from some time before 1317, and perhaps from 1254, to the beginning of the 18th century, the manor was owned by descendants of the de la More family.

Iwood's tenants

The earliest known customary tenants were the four named in the grant of 1228, among them Maud de Iwode, and Robert "of the mill" given with West Mill's grant. Iwood's accounts, 1341-52, name three men who paid a few pence in rent for "moorland" and sometimes the reeve. The 1364 court roll (BL Add Roll 7670) names five tenants, among them Walter Iwode. In 1461, the court (BL Add Roll 7671) named William Lombseed as the new tenant of one of the mills, two absent tenants and another whose house needed repairing.

Nothing is then known of any tenants until 1623, when "The Visitation of Somerset" (Colby Vol XI Harleian Soc. p2) shows a John Allott (Allett), son of Sir John Allott, once Lord Mayor of London, as "of Iwood". Congresbury's parish registers record baptisms for three of his children, the earliest in 1603/4, confirming that the family did actually live in Iwood (SRO D/P/con 2/1/2). The 1622 Congresbury subsidy shows John paid £2, by far the largest payment in the parish (SRO DD/SAS c/795 BK81). The Allotts lived at Iwood from c1603 until, probably, John Allott's death in 1643 (SRO D/P/con 2/1/2).

The 1647 rental of the Blewet's "Manor of Congresbury" (SRO DD/X/FRC 10) shows a William Wallis renting the manor farm by the right of his wife Katherine, for an annual £6 18s 8d plus 12s 1d for two cottages. As rent paid to Lord Poulet for Yatton is shown, the rental included the Yatton land, but no differentiation between that and Iwood is noted. Katherine, a widow in 1664/5, paid tax on 10 hearths (Dwelly 1916 p143) indicating a substantial house, and probably lived at Iwood until her death in 1673 (SRO D/P/con 2/1/1).

Iwood's later owners.

The will of an Alexander Dyer of London, died 1682, mentions his estate at Iwood (PRO PROB 11/371) and his late sister Katherine Wallis, so perhaps they had both had some claim to a share of John Bluet's lands. As, however, a 1706 deed shows one of John Bluet's great-grandsons owning 5/12 of the manor (SRO DD/SF 1036) and a 1715 deeds shows another great-grandson owning a quarter (SRO DD/SL 5), Dyer never owned Iwood outright.

A part copy of an indenture dated 1725 includes another of 1701 which shows a Humphrey Hellier selling 5/12 of the "Manor or reputed Manors of Iwood and Yatton

otherwise Iwood Yatton" (Cran's notes). [This introduces an unsolved problem: 5/12 (1706) + 1/4 (1715) + 5/12 (1701) = 13/12 i.e. more than existed.] The 1701 indenture lists the tenants and areas held, clearly including both Iwood and Yatton lands, but, again, not differentiated. Humphrey "of Iwood in the parish of Congresbury" died in 1705, but the 1701 sale had not been completed because he bequeathed "All that my Manor lying within the parishes of Congresbury and Yatton" to his wife Anne and after her death, to his half brother Thomas Richardson of Redland (PRO PROB 11/484). The 1725 indenture states that Thomas Richardson of Iwood was the son and heir of Thomas Richardson of Redland, Bristol, deceased. Thomas, the son, probably moved to Iwood some time before 1719, when a son was baptised in Congresbury church (SRO D/P/con 2/1/1).

In 1736 J J de Wilstar surveyed and mapped Congresbury manor, but Iwood, outside the manor, is only partially shown. Mr Richardson is given as Iwood's owner but West mill and land nearby was owned by a Mr Dunn. In the surviving part of the 1725 indenture, Thomas Richardson was selling property to William Donne of Bristol, presumably including some of Iwood's land, necessitating the citing of the 1701 indenture re 5/12 of Iwood and Yatton. A 1767 deed, cited in one of 1790 (Deeds owned by Courage (Western) Ltd) shows William Donne had owned West Mill and 25.5 acres of land called Trivett's tenement, possibly the fardel granted in the 13th century. (In 1567 a fardel was about 20 acres (BRO 04235).) In the 1701 indenture a John Trevitt held 24 acres, probably "Trivett's tenement". So West Mill and its fardel were separated from Iwood in 1725, but Iwood's rent, £5 6s 8d, paid since the 13th century was not reduced.

Thomas Richardson died in 1748 (SRO D/P/con 2/1/2) and Iwood passed to his son, another Thomas. Congresbury's land tax returns of 1766 (SRO Q/REL 42/10) show Mr Thos. Richardson paying £12 18s 6d. However no Richardson appears in the land tax returns for Yatton in 1766, (SRO Q/REL 42/26) so not only West Mill and its fardel but also the Yatton lands were no longer appurtenant to Iwood.

A Congresbury Manor rental (BRO 33041 BMC/4/14) shows Hester Richardson, widow, paying Iwood's rent of £5 6s 8d in 1774. From 1782 to 1797 land tax returns show her as Iwood's owner and occupier but in 1800 John Tripp was occupier and in 1805 it was advertised for letting (Bristol Journal 1805) and by 1808 John Tripp was given as owner. Hester and Thomas Richardson's daughter, Hester, had married John Tripp in 1789 (SRO D/P/con 2/1/3), so Iwood once again passed along the female line. John Tripp was still the owner in 1816 as shown by Congresbury's 1816 enclosure award (SRO D/P/con 20/1/1).

An advertisement in the Bristol Mirror, however, shows Iwood House for sale in 1816 and the 1818 Land Tax gives John Norman esq as occupier and owner. In 1829 he advertised it for sale, (Felix Farley's Journal 9 May 1829) but it remained unsold, because it was re-advertised in 1838, (Bristol Mirror 1838) following Mr Norman's death.

Congresbury's 1840 tithe map includes Iwood's first complete survey, with the usual award (SRO D/D/Rt Congresbury). The owners were Trustees of Henry and Mary Merle. The occupier of the Manor house and land was a Charles Parsons and of Iwood mill a John Thomas. Benjamin Thayer owned today's Iwood Farm which includes land once part of the medieval manor. It would seem that the ninth century unit of "Old Auster" had survived almost intact into the nineteenth.

As Iwood had two mills and Yatton none, the obvious, but not necessarily the correct rent for the two mills was 7 marks per annum and for Iwood's land, 1 mark. The following table shows cash income and costs for Iwood land and mills assuming rent at 1 and 7 marks respectively with the cash sums from Yatton manor and other external rents and expenses for comparison. For Iwood, additionally, some wages or parts thereof were paid in grain. However the cash received, had the grain been sold, should have, in theory at least, have equalled any wages paid in cash. No allowance therefore has been made in the overall profits for wages paid in kind.

Cash was sent from Iwood each year to Iwelegh but did not comprise all the profits as the bailiff's arrears grew larger each year, and in two years he was "pardoned" of significant amounts.

Greenham manor was in Ashbrittle but with boundary changes was later in Stawley.

Faringdon manor, Stogursey, was probably just a farmstead now Faringdon Hill Farm

Week Fitzpayne manor was also in Stogursey, possibly sometimes listed as Stogursey - hence the ? in the above table.

Almsworthy manor was in Exford and has not been identified on the ground.

Halfway manor has not been definitely identified, but may be Halsey.
