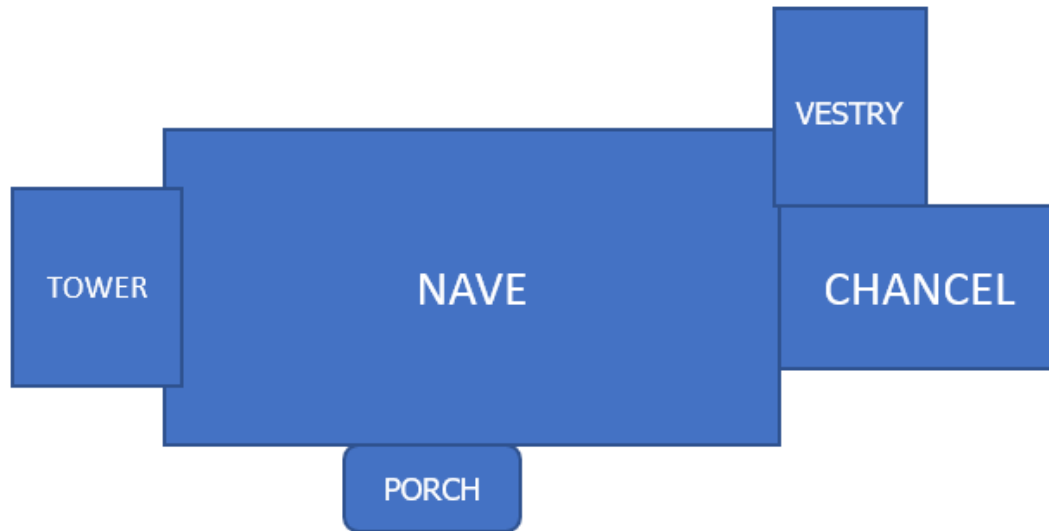

## **SOUTH PORCH**



The porch was rebuilt in 1865.



Inside – decorated for Harvest Home.





The niche above the inner door may once have held a statue of St Lawrence.



The lion's head is said to symbolise the struggle against evil.



The two doors on the west wall access to a stone newel staircase which once led to gallery where the choir sang psalms on Palm Sunday and other occasions.







The archway, left, on the lower matches the equivalent door in the 13<sup>th</sup> century porch at Congresbury, the former mother church door (see the photo below).





This stoupe niche to the right of the entrance to the nave once held a basin containing holy water. Those entering dipped their fingers and crossed themselves, in remembrance of baptismal vows.





On the east wall is the bier. The associated plaque is below.

The bier is likely to date from somewhere between 1683 and 1757. It was in use up until the 1930s to transport the deceased in their coffins from their house to the church. It is a popular local belief that the coffins did not always go by road, but crossed fields and ditches to take the most direct route.

Three memorial slabs lie against the east wall.

 WHO DIED 28<sup>TH</sup> NOV<sup>r</sup> 1824, AGED 52 YEARS.  
 ALSO OF MARY THOMAS,  
 THE LAST SURVIVING CHILD  
 OF THE ABOVE NAMED SAMUEL AND MARY THOMAS,  
 WHO DIED 25<sup>TH</sup> MARCH 1835, AGED 64 YEARS.  
 BY WHOSE DIRECTION THIS MONUMENT  
 WAS ERECTED.

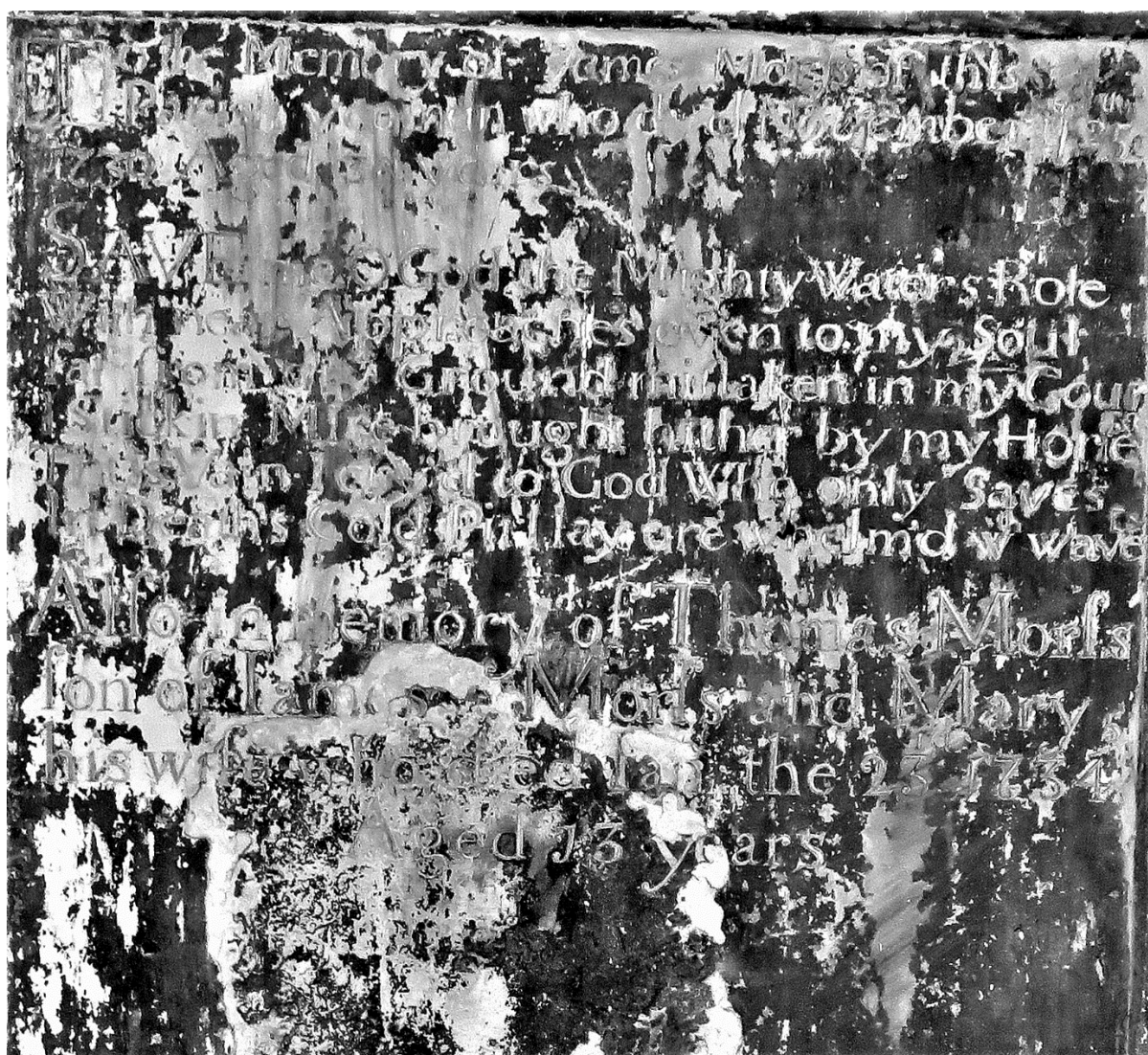

The memorial tablet, removed for safety reasons from inside the church, is inscribed

'To the Memory of James Morss of this  
 Parish Yeoman who died November y<sup>e</sup> 25th  
 1730 Aged 38 years  
 SAVE me O God the Mighty Waters Role  
 With near Approaches even to my Soul  
 far from dry Ground mistaken in my Cour[se]  
 I stick in Mire brought hither by my Horse  
 Thus Vain I cried to God Who only Saves  
 In Death's Cold Pit I lay ore whelm'd w<sup>th</sup> waves  
 Also in memory of Thomas Morss  
 son of James Morss and Mary  
 his wife who died Jan the 23<sup>rd</sup> 1734  
 Aged 13 years

The verse is a parody of Psalm 69. Save me O God for the waters are come in unto my soul.

It is believed that James was trying to ford the Congresbury Yeo when he became stuck. This is supported by Francis Knight in his book *The Seaboard of Mendip* where he refers to the tablet "in memory of a man who having lost his way was overtaken by the tide and drowned."

## SOUTH WALL

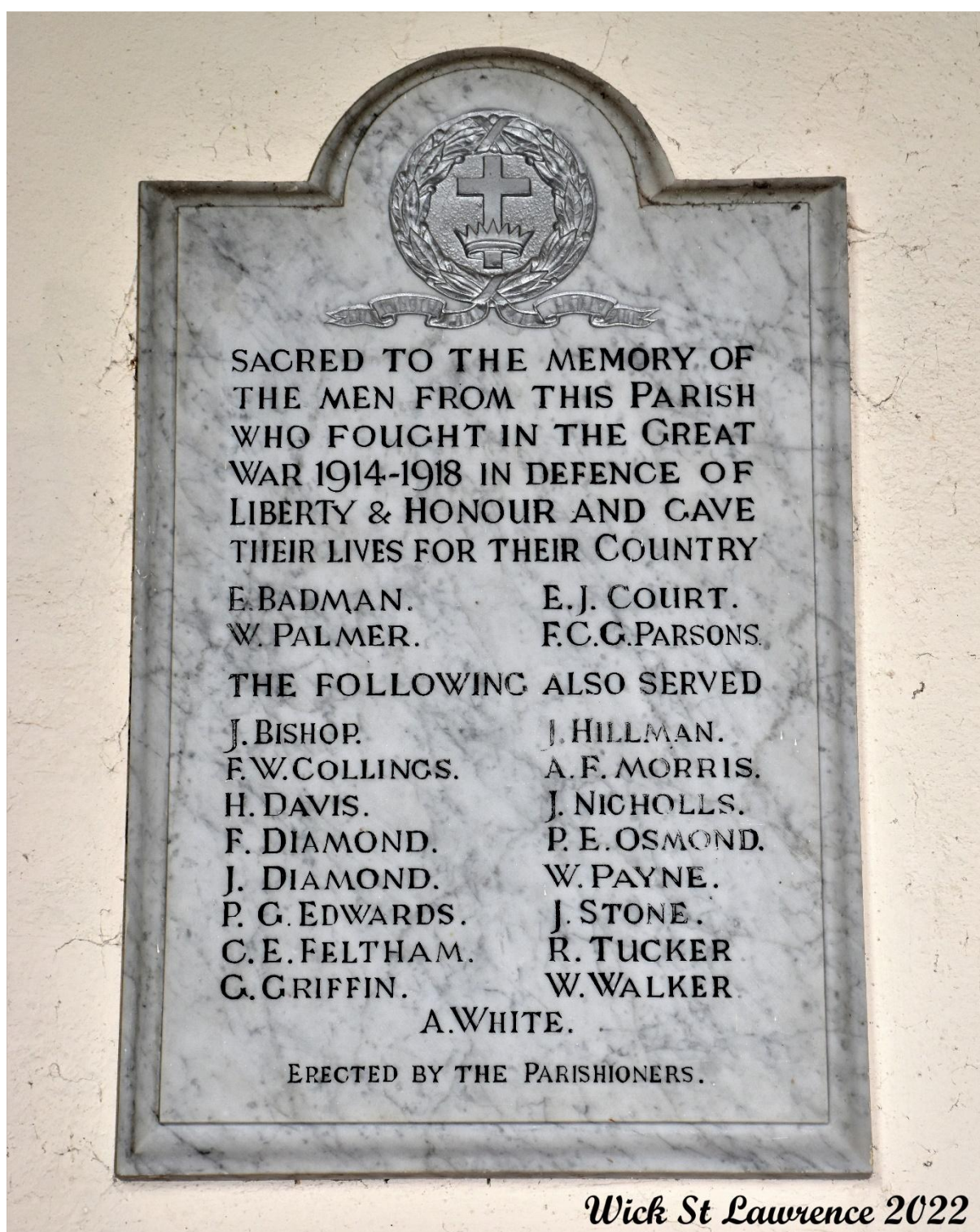


Near the entrance is this Norman plain bowl font perhaps from an earlier church. The plinth was added in 1841.

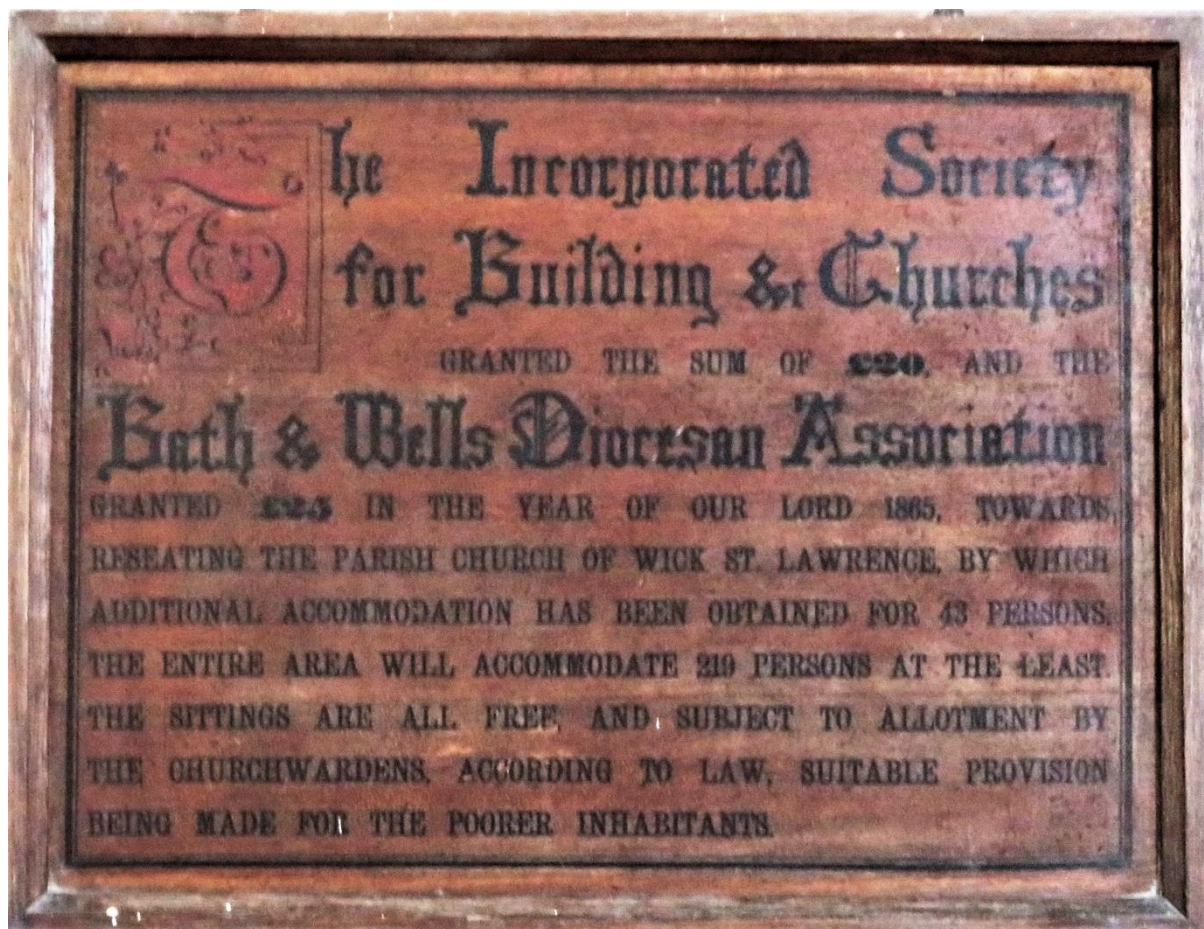








To the east of the entrance door is a First World War memorial plaque.

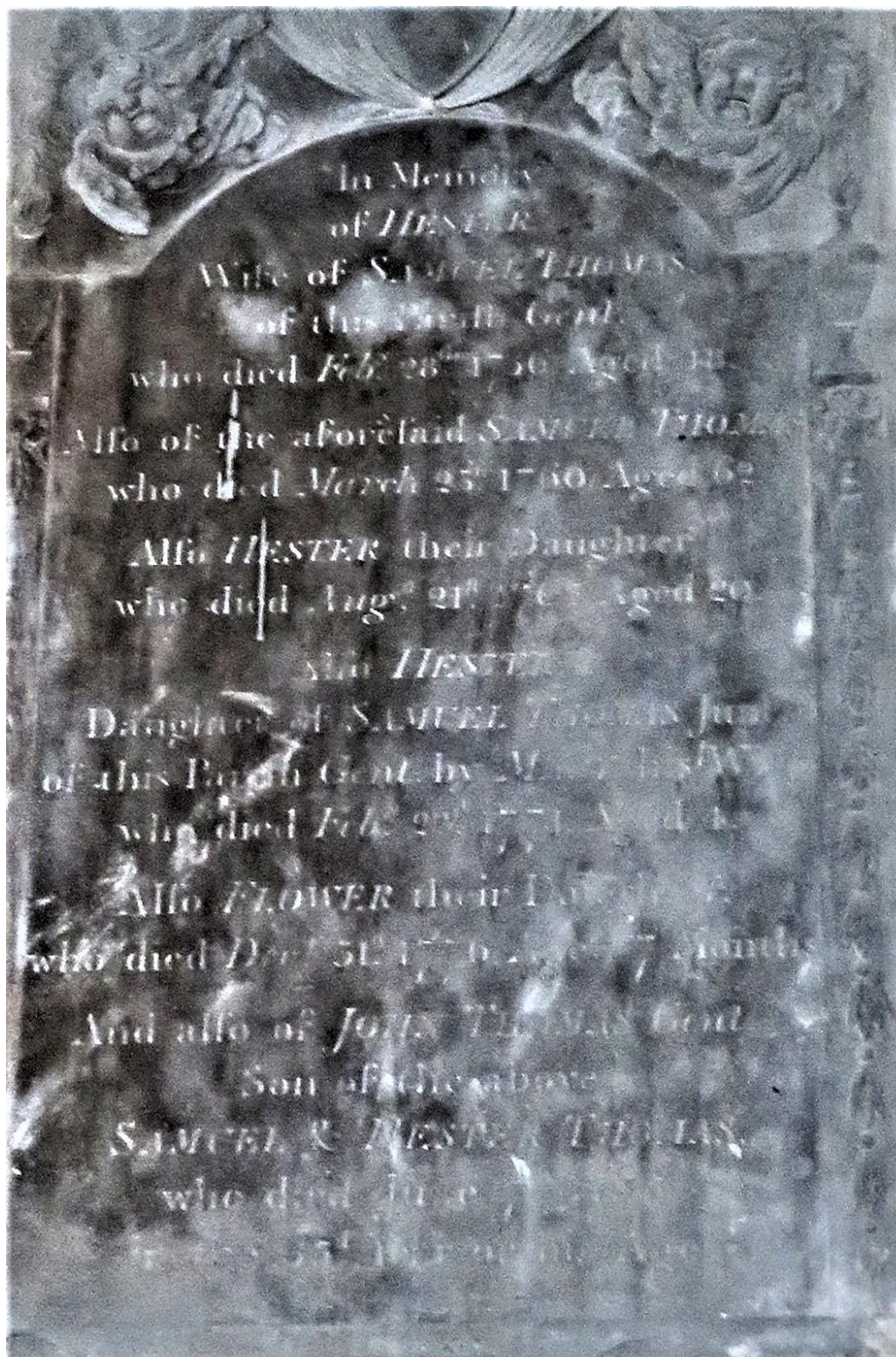


This plaque is to the west of the entrance door.

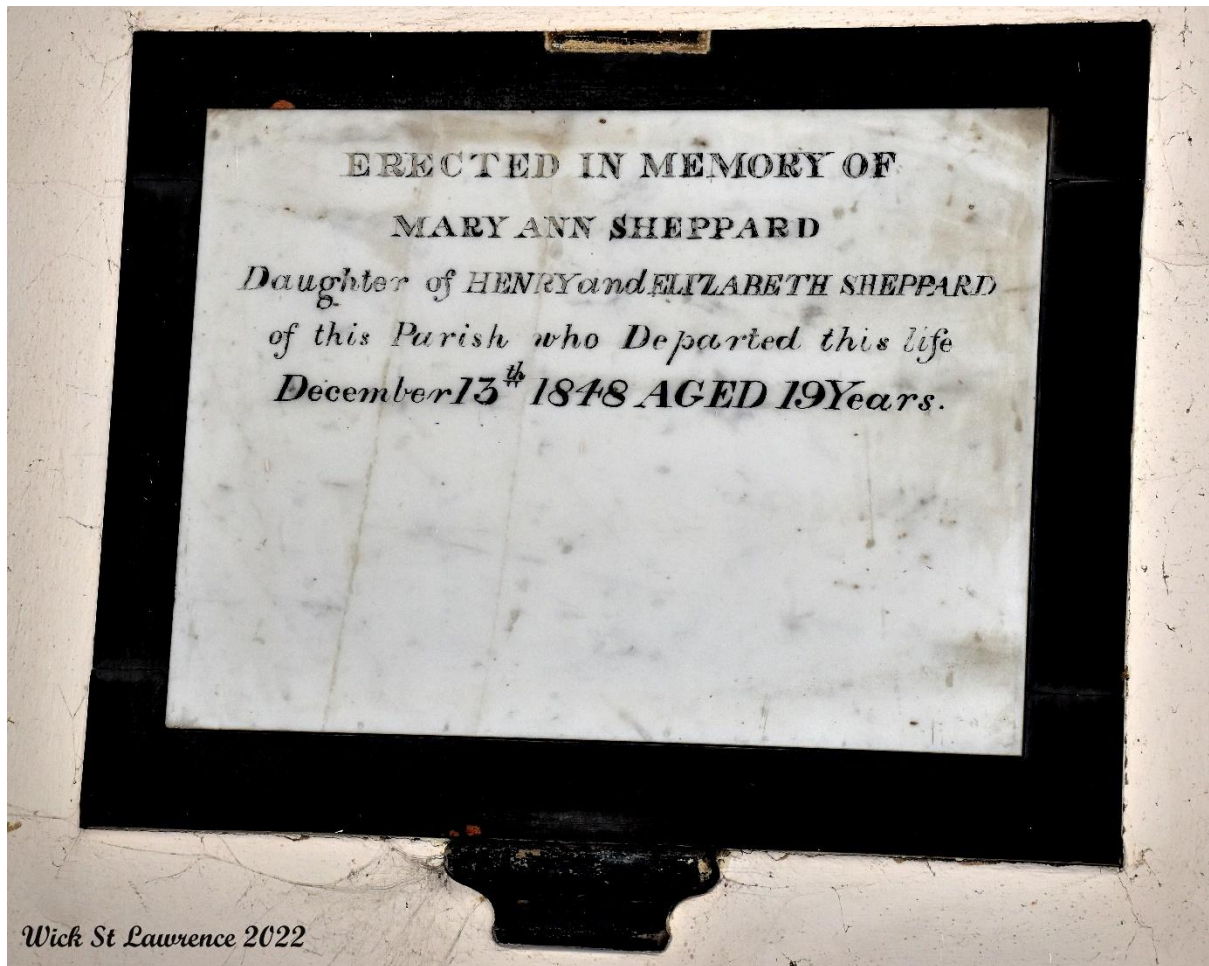

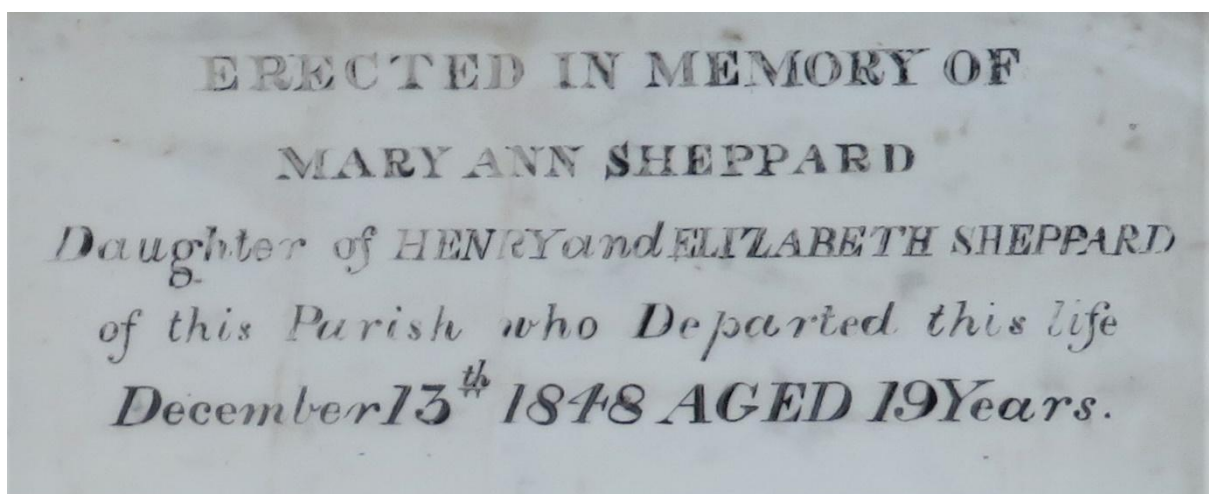

## NORTH WALL

On the far west of the north wall is this plaque



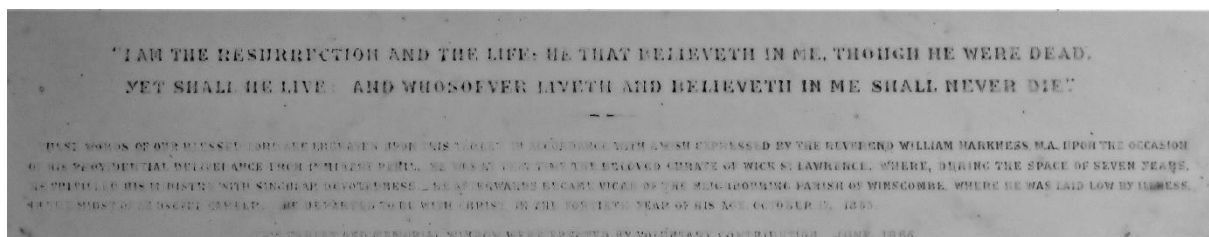


On the north wall (almost opposite the entrance door and to the left) is the blocked up north door. Originally for processional use it may have been sealed to prevent draughts.



To the right of the blocked door is a memorial window and plaque to the Reverend William Harkness.





The plaque below the window reads:

"I AM THE RESURRECTION AND THE LIFE. HE THAT BELIEVETH IN ME, THOUGH HE WERE DEAD YET SHALL HE LIVE AND WHOSOEVER LIVETH AND BELIEVETH IN ME SHALL NEVER DIE."

THESE WORDS OF OUR BLESSED LORD ARE ENGRAVEN UPON THIS TABLET IN ACCORDANCE WITH A WISH EXPRESSED BY THE REVEREND WILLIAM HARKNESS M.A. ON THE OCCASION OF HIS PROVIDENTIAL DELIVERANCE FROM IMMINENT PERIL. HE WAS AT THAT TIME BELOVED CURATE OF WICK ST LAWRENCE, WHERE DURING THE SPACE OF SEVEN YEARS, HE FULFILLED HIS MINISTRY WITH SINGULAR DEVOTEDNESS. HE AFTERWARDS BECAME VICAR OF THE NEIGHBOURING PARISH OF WINSCOMBE WHERE IN THE MIDST OF A USEFUL CAREER HE DEPARTED TO BE WITH CHRIST IN THE FORTIETH YEAR OF HIS AGE OCTOBER 17, 1863.

THIS TABLET AND MEMORIAL WINDOW WERE ERECTED BY VOLUNTARY CONTRIBUTION JUNE 1865

The providential deliverance from imminent peril was a pond at Rose Farm into which his horse and carriage had tipped.

To the left of the pulpit on the north wall is a lower and an upper door. This was the stair access to the rood loft, above the screen, which had a platform stretching the width of the church. On it would have been rood, or large crucifix. The priest may have occasionally preached from here, and the church orchestra or band played, maybe accompanying a soloist from the choir.

The screen was a carved wooden affair. It is said to have survived the aftermath of the Dissolution of the Monasteries since the churchwardens' accounts show that the screen door lock was repaired in 1753, and in 1762 a new lock fitted.







This magnificent pulpit was given to the church by John Carr, Lord of the Manor of Wick St Lawrence, whose father, 30 years after the Dissolution, had purchased Woodspring Priory.

Pevsner states that it was reputedly brought from the priory in the late 16<sup>th</sup> century and describes it as *"One of the finest medieval stone pulpits in Somerset, very daintily detailed, with panelled stem, panelled body and frizzes of quatrefoils, fluerons, horizontal leaf – trails etc."*

The pulpit was severely damaged by a lighting strike in 1791 but skillfully repaired. it was slightly enlarged in 1865 when all paint was removed.







A model of the church and associated plaque is to the left of the pulpit.



The church model sits on the parish chest, which held parishioners' wills, doctrine books and parish registers and records. This chest may date to the 18th century and had three locks, with different keys, each in the possession of two or more church officials so that no single person could open it. In 1825 an iron chest (now lost) was purchased for £4.15.00. A large sum then.

## CHANCEL

The Reverend Harkness presented the first organ in 1848, when curate. Another curate the Reverend Aubrey Townsend, was so pleased with the choir, (formed in 1861), that in 1863 he presented a new organ costing £36.

Five years later the parishioners raised £120 for yet another. Made by W. Sweetland of Bath in 1867 this is the one we can see today, with the plaque below, which was in regular use until 1993, when a modern pipeless model was presented by the late Mrs. Pamela Spurner of Wick St Lawrence. This stands on the south side of the church.





To the right of the old organ is a passageway leading to the vestry room erected on the north east side of the church in the 19th century. On the right of this passage is the window below.

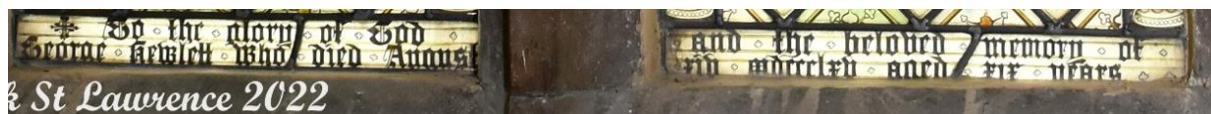

The inscription reads:

Below the window is this piscina which was used to wash the vessels after mass. Little of the original work remains.



On the south wall the now blocked priest's door allowed entry to the chancel without having to go through the nave.



## FLOOR – GRAVE STONES

On the floor, mainly in the east of the church, can be seen gravestones, mostly of the Sheppard family, local landowners.

These are the remains of those dug up in the mid-19th century installation of underfloor heating.

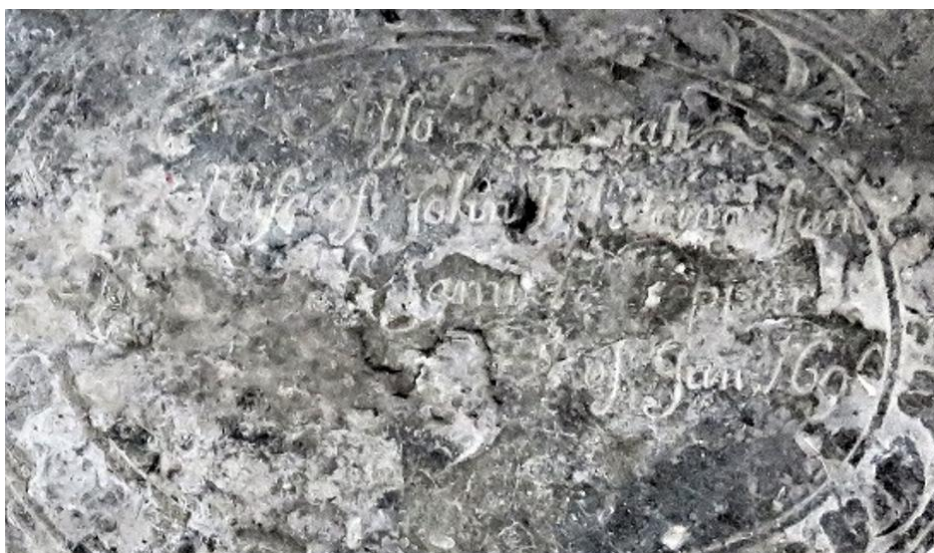

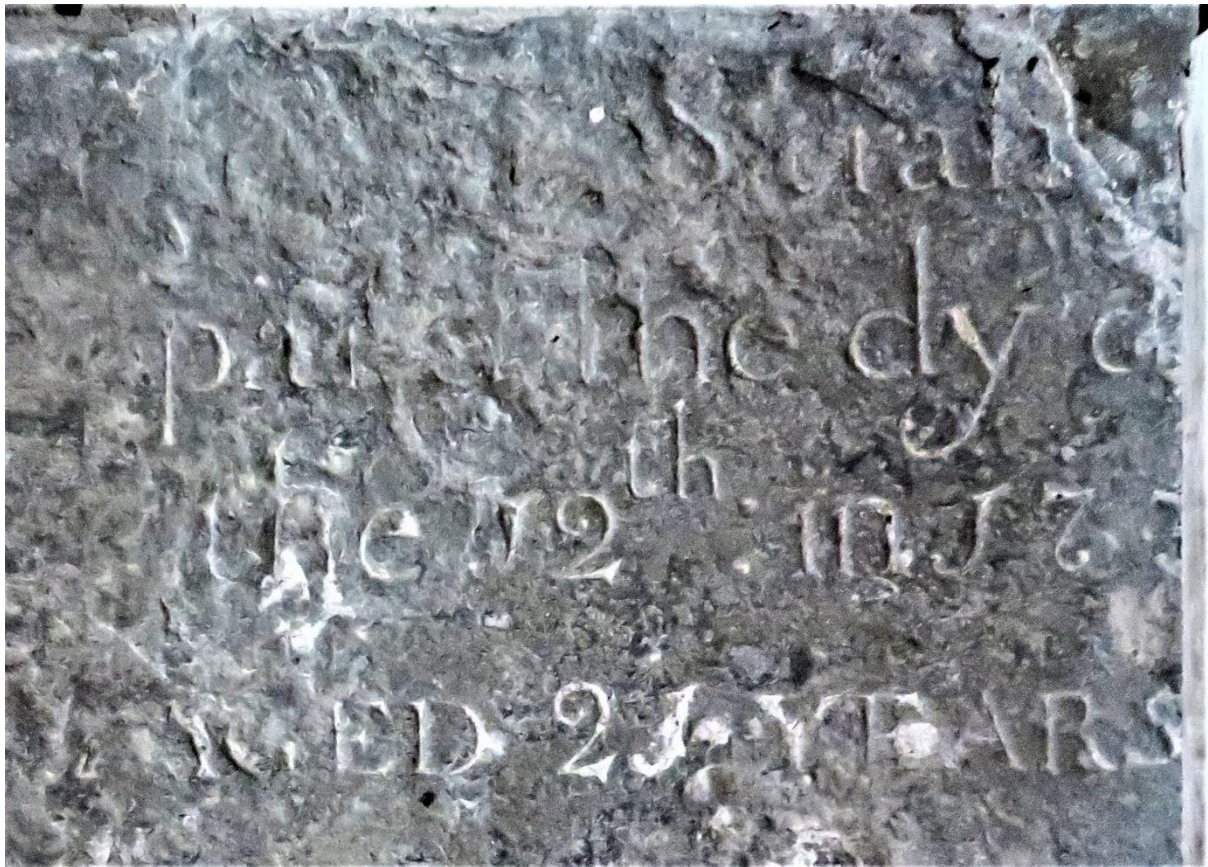

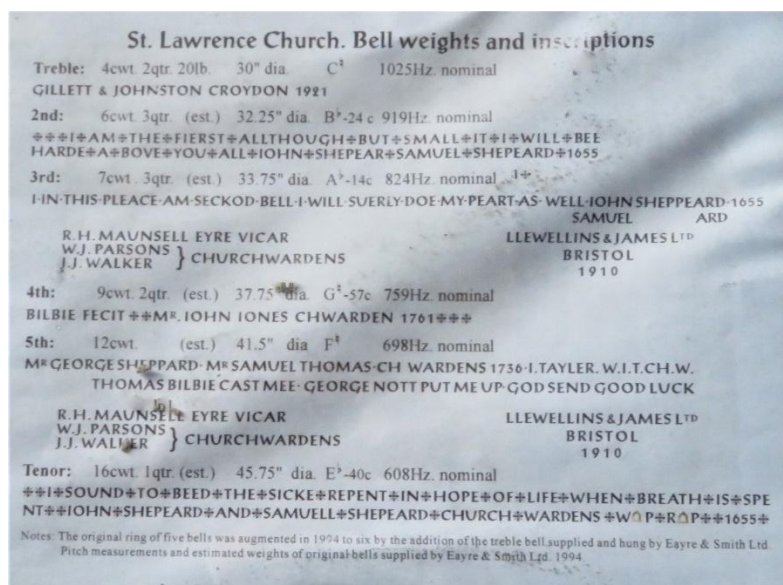
