The survey was undertaken as part of a presentation to the public attending a community event. No evidence was found of any pre-19th century structures.

Introduction

Yatton, Congresbury, Claverham and Cleeve Archaeological Research Team (YCCCART) is one of a number of Community Archaeology teams across northern Somerset, formerly supported by the North Somerset Council Development Management Team.

Our objective is to undertake archaeological fieldwork to enable a better understanding and management of the heritage of the area while recording and publishing the activities and locations of the research carried out.

Site Location

The site is at ST42906572, on the south-west side of High Street, Yatton, in North Somerset. GPS readings for the survey area are in Appendix A.

Land use and geology

The surveyed area is a lawn in the grounds of a Masonic Lodge building. It lies on a ridge of Mercia Mudstones, topped with post-glacial Head deposits, as does most of Yatton village. This is surrounded by the later alluvial clays and peats of the Northmarsh.

Historical & archaeological context




Fig 2: Extract from 1844-1888 OS 25" 1st Edition. Know Your Place (http://www.kypwest.org.uk/)

Yatton village was initially centred on the church, being a very large village at Domesday (1086), and was one of the residences of the Bishop of Bath and Wells. It always had a string of isolated farmsteads along High Street to the north as far as the hamlet of Northend. This plan survived until the third quarter of the 20th century, when new housing to the east and west of High Street swamped it in residential housing.

Larchmount Hall was built on the survey site between 1885 and 1903, in a field formerly known as Osborne's Two Acres, which was clearly once part of, or immediately adjacent to, Elborough Field (Yatton TA). The name of this formerly open field contains the OE suffix '-burh' = 'earthwork, place surrounded by a bank', implying some early occupation in the vicinity.

The lawn subject of this survey seems to have been laid out at the building of the Hall (OS plan, 1903). For 35 years, the Hall was a 'school for young ladies'. In 1925 it became a laboratory, and the Hall was gutted by fire in March 1935 and rebuilt, and after 1935 it became the Masonic Lodge. Survey objectives

The surveys were undertaken to identify and obtain details of any archaeology lying below the lawn, immediately adjacent to Yatton High Street.

Methodology

The survey was undertaken on 2 September 2017 by a team from YCCCART using a eoscan RM 15 resistivity meter.

The completed surveys were downloaded to a TerraSurveyor programme and the resultant composite adjusted using the following filters:

Resistivity

Band weight equaliser Grad shade Despiked Clip SD2 High Pass filter.

The report was written in Microsoft Word 2016.

Results




Fig 6: TerraSurveyor shade black and white and colour images. High readings are black and red.

This relatively small area surveyed, and the presence of the trees, make the results difficult to interpret. The tree root system, with its dewatering, is certainly responsible for the high resistance in the west corner of the survey area, and probably for most of the rest of the responses. There is no real evidence from this survey of pre-19th century structures in the area.

Recommendations

There is no current need for further archaeological work. The site of the lawn on the edge of the High Street implies increased potential for archaeology to remain here, but the presence of the trees has prevented this survey from demonstrating the presence of any such structures.
