




YATTON CHURCH INSIDE

PART 3 CHANCEL AND CROSSING (TOWER).




CHANCEL




Looking east. The chancel is said to be a 14^{th} century (1380) extension of an earlier (1250) construction.






Segment of the east window.

This window was erected by his parishioners and other friends

ROOF

The roof is much lower than the nave and retains the old steep pitch that follows the line of the original stone drip course on the outside of the tower.



The roof design mirrors that in the nave.



This plaque is on the north wall is to the right of the doorway.




According to Pevsner the window is signed Henry Hughes c 1865

The splendid brass and enamel lectern is thought to be dated 1872.












The lectern plaque reads

The window on the extreme south-east wall. According to Pevsner all the stained glass windows on the south side are by Clayton and Bell and the one above was recorded in 1877.

Below this window are the following items:

To the Glory of God

In memory of Sarah Tucker who Died March 31st 1861
This Window was Erected by her Sister Emma Tucker

Tucker family memorials are also on the chancel floor.







The door in the south wall is a priest's door which allowed the priests to enter and leave the chancel without walking through the nave. This is an example of how the priesthood and the laity used to separate themselves.



To the left of the door is this piscina (19 th c?).



Each chair has a memorial plaque like the one below.



THE CROSSING

The crossing is the area beneath the tower and the junction of nave, chancel and north and south transepts. The tower, originally supported on four square columns, was in the 1450s strengthened with flutted stonework.

VESTRY

There is no public access to the Vestry but its south window can be partly viewed from the crossing.






This is the only window in its original decorated style.

There are four 15^{th} century (damaged during restorations) stained glass shields, said to be of


- 1) & 4) the Vyell family of the manor of Claverham
- 2) a Popham (wife of a Vyell)

3) the arms of England and France (During a restoration several pieces were lost and pieces from 2 and 4 incorporated).



During the 1870s restoration the floral decoration on the vaulting was applied.
